

The Rebel States

Col. Forney, in one of his "Occasional" letters to the Press, thus comments on the treachery manifested by the Southern people in professing to accept the results of the war. He says: "There is scarcely a Southern State in which the wisdom of restraining the rebel spirit by martial law has not been vindicated. There are but three in which, up to the present moment, the old elements of strife and dissension do not wield a fatal sway; these are Kansas, Florida, and probably Texas. I will not repeat how heartlessly, President Johnson's generosity has been reciprocated in Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama, (where John Forsyth, the editor of the Mobile Register a Democratic leader, openly advocates the payment of the traitors' war debt, and Mr. W. Langdon of the Mobile district, in the face of his notorious unwillingness to take the oath), and Louisiana, where the "Democratic" ticket has lately polled such heavy majorities. Nor need I cite our nearest neighbor, Virginia, which, in the midst of her rags and ruin, elects men to Congress who insult the authority they should penitentially obey, and denounce the oath imposed even upon loyal representatives, as a wanton abuse of power. But let us to the North Carolina, that was set up as a model for the seceded and insurrectionary States. With a chief eponym that baffles all parallel of the domains of slavery itself, and that defies human description, a delegation from this State called upon the President last Friday, and asked that their claimants should be admitted to Congress, in disregard of the oath imposed by both branches of that body on all of their members! This President answered them kindly, but told them that "Something better remained to be done to render that restoration immediately practicable. An acceptance of the Congressional amendment abolishing slavery throughout the United States by the State of North Carolina is, in my judgment, practically important to the successful restoration which is so much desired by all. Without answering specifically the questions you have proposed to me, it will be sufficient to say that my action must depend on events, and that Mr. Holden will be again instructed to continue the exercise of his functions as Provisional Governor until he shall have been expressly relieved by orders to that effect." Yet, even while this demand was made upon the Government, the voters of North Carolina were putting the most stinging slight upon the President by voting down this same Mr. Holden, the Union candidate for Governor, whose election the President had so much at heart, and by putting in over his head the champion of the payment of the rebel war debt. The comment upon the petition of the leaders to the President could not have been more characteristic. From these specimens it is seen that the duty of Congress is made easy. The efforts of the President to induce the rebel chiefs to accept his mild and generous counsel have been followed by a new series of aggressions and insults. What they have done in accordance with his repeated invitations has been coldly and reluctantly done and with a spirit insistent with the idea that treason was no crime, but rather an honorable achievement. A very eminent rebel, who has seen and noted these bad signs in the South, remarked, a few days ago: "I know that the men who are guilty of these proceedings felt, as they fought against the Government, that if they were defeated they lost everything, and that even their lives were forfeited to the national authority. They would have been grateful had May to be permitted to exist. Now a little kindness has revived the tiger's appetite, and they will fight for everything they want to win." Let us thank a loyal people that we have a firm and resolute and unflinching Congress, who will protect the Republic against the new rebellion. It is not pleasant to write in such a spirit; but it would be folly to deny that these manifestations of bad faith have discouraged us, if they have not wholly destroyed the belief that generous treatment to the rebellious sections was the best policy. The late elections proved two things conclusively; first, that the overwhelming majority of the people of this country are resolved that all the vestiges and seed of the late rebellion shall be forever destroyed; and, second, that the elements that defested the insurgents in the field, and sustained the civil authorities in executing the laws, if a state of unparalleled warfare, can administer the Government and protect all the loyal people of the country without the aid and in defiance of disaffected men or minorities, if THAT MIGHT BE.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE

Here is the whole story copied from Mr. Monroe's message, delivered December 2, 1823: With the existing colonies or dependencies of any European power we have not interfered and shall not interfere. But with the governments who have declared their independence, and maintained it, and whose independence we have on great consideration and on just principles acknowledged, we could not view any interposition for the purpose of oppressing them, or controlling in any other manner their destiny by any European power in any other light than as a manifestation of an unfriendly disposition toward the United States.
