5. If the soldier left no widow, legitimate child, nor father, or if the father has abandoned the support of port of the family, or if he resides out of the United States, the mother, if she resides in the United States, is entitled to the pay and bounty, and if poor and de-

ted States or have abandoned the support of their families, should write to the undersigned at once, or the father may get the bounty without the facts being known.

6. All soldiers who have lost an arm and one leg. are entitled to Twenty dollars per month. Prisoners of war are entitled to Three Months extra pay.
