Collection of Taxes.-We must ask grace of a friend Tho, some weeks ago, requested us to write something about the best way to collect taxes. We do not like the mode suggested—the payment of the taxes into the Treaswrer's Office at Wellsboro by the taxpayer. It is too cumbrous and expensive. A better way, as already tested, would be for the Treasurer to sit down and plan the circuit of the county; having done which, to give ample notice that he will attend at certain times and places in each township, and receive and receipt for taxes. Those paying promptly to be entitled to a reduction, and those neglecting the summons to pay the full levy and

all expense for collecting in addition. Of course this is not a new mode of collecting taxes. It prevails in many parts of the country, and effects at great saving to both the public and taxpayer. Experience proves that it is always cheaper for one man to ollect all the taxes in a township. So it is better for one man to collect all the taxes in a county. The present system is too cumbrons.
