

Effects of Lightning. In the case of persons apparently killed by lightning, too much haste should not be exhibited in burial. Not far from where this is written, five boys were struck at once, one of whom received a severe wound on the right leg. They remained perfectly insensible for a considerable length of time, but eventually recovered. The invention of lightning conductors has, no doubt, saved a vast number of buildings. We no longer hear of large numbers of persons killed in a building at one stroke, as in a locality where no fewer than eighty-six persons, and where we observe in passing, the commander of Giganti in order to break a thick cloud which he conceived to be a waterspout, had some heavy guns drawn out of the casemates and fired at it; but instead of having the effect he desired, fire descended from the cloud and instantly wrapped the pieces in a sheet of flame, and left several of the gunners dead. Before Sir Snow Harris applied conductors to ships, the case of a vessel being struck was common, and hardly a year passed without the spire of a church being damaged or wholly destroyed by lightning.
