We accompanied the Principal through the building, and from dormitury to kitchen we noted the same scrupulous neatness and admirable order. And from the most charming snuggery where the Professor keeps his household gods, we proceeded to the dining-hall, where we took a most excellent tea, sitting down with a hundred students, who seasoned the repast with pleasant conversation.
