SCHOOLS.—By the Report of the State Superintendent of Common Schools it appears that Tioga county has 234 Schools, the average attendance on which is 5,649; average number of months taught 5,58; male teachers 28; female 298; average wages of males \$33.81; of females, \$28.93; amount of tax levied for school purposes, \$3,920.27; amount received from all sources, \$22,872.20; expended for instruction, contingencies, building, &c., \$38,960.83; balance in treasuries, \$3,200; permanent debt \$600; temporary debt, \$853.97. Tioga boros pays the highest wages, Delmar has the largest number of schools, and Charleston the highest number of scholars.

KEEP A DAIRY.—This is pre-eminently a grazing county, and whoever lives to see fifteen years from this time will live to see Tioga county in the front rank of butter, cheese, and stock-raising counties. While large crops of wheat, oats, and barley can be produced on our soil, it is now admitted that none of these grain crops are certain enough to make it profitable to plant the grain. Our soil is not only naturally grass-producing, but the grass is of a very superior quality for stock.

We therefore urge farmers to turn their attention, as well as their capital, to dairying. There ought to be two-dozen cheese factories in this county before next June. Charleston, alone will have three. Nearly every other township will add ten per cent. to the present value of its improved farms by following her example. In this way Tioga county can be made one of the richest counties in the State.
