PHOTOGRAPHS OF PENNSYLVANIA OFFICERS .-It is proposed by the State authorities to procure a full history of the services rendered by Pennsylvania regiments in the war to crush the slave-holders' rebellion; and, as an interesting portion of that history, it has been suggested by Gover-nor Curtin that the State Librarian collect photo-graphs of all officers of such regiments, to be de-posited in the State Library, in such a form as to be easily referred to and examined; in accordance with this proposition, the State Librarian now requires such officers to send well executed card photographs of themselves, and addressed to the State Library; and where the officer has perished, that the friends of the gallant dead send such photographs. Each card to be carefully inscribed beneath the photograph with the name, rank, company and regiment in which the officer served.
