PHOTOGRAPHS OF PENNSYLVANIA OFFICERS.—It is proposed by the State authorities to procure a full history of the services rendered by Pennsylvania regiments in the war to crush the slaveholders' rebellion; and as an interesting portion of that history, it has been suggested by Governor Curtin that the State Librarian collect photographs of all officers of such regiments, to be deposited in the State Library, in such a form as to be easily referred to and examined in connection with this project, the State Librarian now requires such officers to send well executed card photographs of themselves, and addressed to the State Library; and where the officer has perished, that the friend or the relative send such photographs. Each card to be carefully inscribed beneath the photograph with the name, rank, company and regiment in which the officer served. Our contemporaries throughout the Commonwealth are earnestly requested to aid in the success of this undertaking, by urging immediate compliance with the request for these photographs. In twenty-five years, such a collection of photographs will be the most valuable work in the Library.—Reading Times.
