1. \$100 to three years men who served their 2. \$100 to three years men discharged by renson of wounds received in service.

37 100 to the widow, minor smiletin, of parents, in the order named, of any such soldier who died of wounds or disease contracted in ser-

vice.

4. \$50 to each soldier not included in the foregoing classes, who enlighted for two years or more, and discharged after forying lwh years.

5. \$50 to every soldier enlished for two years, and discharged by season of wounds received in the line of duty.

6. \$50 to the widow, &c., as above, of every soldier enlished for less than two years, who died in service, or of wounds or discase contracted in the army.

No additional bounty is allowed to three years' men who have received, or have herefore been entitled to receive, more than \$100 national bounty, and none to two years' men, who have re-ceived, or are entitled to more than \$50. The law only applies to honorably discharged soldiers of the late war, and to none who have sold or transferred their discharges or rights to bounty.
