WELLSBORO, PA., Aug. 7, 1866. Hon. ALB. W. RANDALL, Washington, D. C. Sir.—I have this day received your favor, enclosing a "Call" for a National Convention at Philadelphia on the 14th inst.

I do not approve it, and I will frankly tell you the reasons why I do not, although I know full well that my frankness involves my removal as Post Master.

I have noticed, and you have noticed, that the Union Convention, as nearly without exception, either gathered at those who said openly here in the North, that the South could not be conquered by force of arms, and sought to make good this prediction by their actual sympathy.

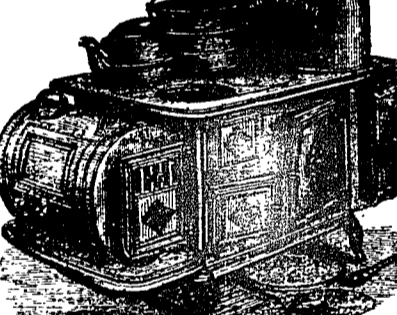

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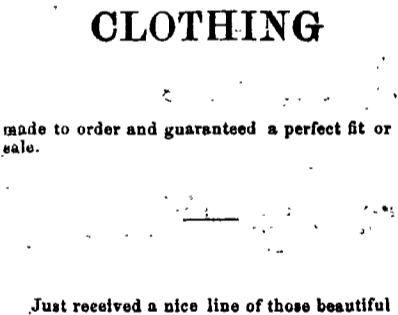

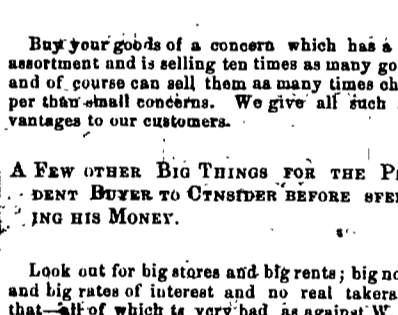

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Important to Soldiers.

THE bill to equalize bounties has become a law. The following is an analysis of its provisions:

- 1. \$100 to three years' men who served their time. 2. \$100 to three years' men discharged by reason of wounds received in service. 3. \$100 to the widow, minor children, or parents, in the order named, of any such soldier who died of wounds or disease contracted in service. 4. \$50 to each soldier not included in the foregoing classes, who enlisted for two years or more, and discharged after serving two years. 5. \$50 to every soldier enlisted for two years, and discharged by reason of wounds received in the line of duty. 6. \$50 to the widow, &c., as above, of every soldier enlisted for less than two years, who died in service, or of wounds or disease contracted in the army. No additional bounty is allowed to three years' men who have been recruited, or have heretofore been entitled to receive more than \$100 national bounty, and none to two years' men, who have received, or are entitled to more than \$50. The law only applies to honorably discharged soldiers of the late war, and to none who have sold or transferred their discharges or rights to bounty.
