PORK CHOPS AND STEAKS.—Cut from the best end of the loin, or from the chump or leg if steaks; remove the fat and skin; turn them frequently and quickly while broiling. If the gridiron be of the old fashion, it is better to keep it ssinnt on the fire. The handle being the lowest part it prevents very much of the fat from falling into the fire, the fiare of which is apt to impart a disagreeable flavor to the chops. This observation applies also to mutton chops, ervation applies also to mutton chops, and it is useful if followed. Sprinkle them with salt when done, and rub with a little fresh butter previous to serving; if for a side dish, garnish with

crisped parsley.




