

Domestic Receipts.

We have tried in our family the following receipts, and find them to be worthy of adoption:

POKE CROPS AND STEAKS.—Cut from the best end of the loin, or from the chump or leg if stocks are frequently and quickly while broiling. If the gridiron be of the old fashion, it is better to keep the lowest part of the fire. The handle being the fat from falling into the fire, the flame of which is apt to impart to the greasable flavor to the chops. This observation applies also to mutton chops, and it is useful if followed. Sprinkle them with salt when done, and rub with a little fresh butter previous to serving; if for a side dish, garnish with crisped parsley.

A MUTTON SKEW.—This is a very good and economical skewer for dinner. Take a shoulder of mutton of lamb, stew it well, then make a dressing of tomatoes, carrots, and a little onions, season well.

TO PRESERVE PUMPKIN.—Select the ripest and largest in the field, pare and cut them dry, then spread it on sheets and dry it in the oven with a slow fire until all the moisture is extracted, when it will be a dry, hard thin layer, which may be packed away in a dry place until required for use. Be careful to dry, not to cook or bake it, while in the stove oven. When required for use soak it over night in sweet milk. By following these directions you may have pumpkin pies all the year round.
