Steel and How Made.

malleable, or wrought iron, theoretically contains no carbon, but probably few specimens exist without containing some. Cast iron has four or five per cent, and steel only from one-half to one and a half per cent. As the proportion of carbon in steel increases so i in fusibility as east iron; but with di-minishing proportions of carbon it asmalleability, and toughness of wrought iron. This pro-cess improves the quality of the steel and fits it for some purposes: but there is another method of treating the blist ered steel; that is to melt the steel in air-tight crucibles and cast it. The ingots are then re-heated, and hammer ing and rolling is very important. 

Steel is a variety of iron occupying position between wrought iron and cast iron, having less of carbon than cast iron and more than wrought iron. Pure becomes hard and brittle and increases sumes more and more of the softness, in Germany direct from pig iron which

being hardened and tempered.
The usual method of producing steel is by cementation or conversion, bars of wrought iron being used. A furnace of suitable form contains boxes made of fire brick in which the bars of iron are powder. The bars do not touch each other, but each is enveloped with the charcoal. When filled the pots are covered and comented air tight. Heat is then applied by the proper furnace and grates and the fire gradually increased in intensity for several days. A test bar is introduced at the beginning and is occasionally withdrawn to determine the progress of the process. 
