PREPARATION OF WHITEWASH.—Whitewash is one of the most valuable articles in the world when properly applied. It prevents not only the decay of wood, but conduces greatly to the healthiness of all buildings, whether o wood of stone. Out-buildings and fences, when not painted, should be supported on twice every year with a plied once or twice every year with a good coat of whitewash, which should be prepared in the following way:— Take a clean, water-tight barrel, or oth ey suitable cask, and put into it half a bushel of lime. Slake it by pouring water over it, boiling hot, and in sufficient quantity to cover it five inches deep, and stir it briskly till thoroughly allered. slaked. When the claking has been ef fected, dissolve it in water, and add two pounds of sulphate of zinc, and one of common salt. These will cause the wash to harden, and prevent its crackwash to harden, and prevent its cracking, which gives an unseemly appearance to the work. If desirable, a beautiful cream color may be communicated to the above wash, by adding three pounds of yellow ochre; or a good pearl or lead color, by the addition of lamp, vine or ivory black. For fawn color, add four pounds umber—Turkish or American, the latter is the cheapest—one nound Indian red and one nound one pound Indian red, and one pound common lampblack. For common stone color add four pounds raw umber and two pounds lampblack. This wash may be applied with a common whitewash brush, and will be found much superior, both in appearance and durability to common whitewash.


