Very little hay was kept over, and the increase of cow-keeping is so considera-ble that most farmers will feed what would i ave cen, otherwise, a surplus. Winter wheat is a great crop, here, as elsewhere; and much more was sowed last year than usual. Spring wheat looks well also. Oats, if not too dry will be a full crop. Corn is "bunkum." Potatoes nover looked better, but they are now setting and it is very dry. Six hours' rain now would ensure a fine crop in quantity, and the stalk growth does not indicate rot yet. From the best sources of information the news is that crops on the ground are now less than six days behind the growth of last year.

THE CLYMER CASUALTY.—Arelative of Mr. Chauncey Dimmick, whose sudden death was noted last week, gives us additional particulars of the circumstance attending the accident somewhat modifying the account given last week. Mr. Dimmick's body was found about eight feet from the stub which he was felling. It seems that he had nearly half severed the stub, which was a large one, and had left his axe in the scarf. He lay with his head toward the stub, with the left leg doubled under the body. There was no contusion found on the body whatever; and close examination does not warrant the supposition that he was hit by a piece of bark, or by any falling limb. The neck was encircled by a dark discoloration, and much swollen, yet there is no evidence of dislocation.
