Wheat so harvested gets the benefit of all the moisture in the straw whereas, if it lies in the swarth even twenty or thirty minutes on a bright day, the straw will wilt, and stop the circulation between the joints and the berry.

Second-It is an error to haul any grain to the barn before it is cured. If hauted too soon it will sweat too much, and even mould. If farmer, had to pay whatfage there would be some excuse for doing it. It arises from habit, and a lack of confidence in Him who has promised seedtime and barvest. Threshing such grain has caused much sickness and useless expense, and grinding such wheat has plagued the millers. Worse than all, the life of such wheat is apt to be killed, and thus the women and bakers are troubled about

raising the sponge. In order to harvest wheat properly, the land should be in good order and only the best seed own. The ground should be dragged if in good order, but not if it be wet, and the sowing late .-Otherwise weeds will grow up, and mould the sheaves when bound after the reaper. 
