Dairy Balt. It is important to have good salt for the

preservation of meats, and more espec-ially so for butter and onesse. The complaints heard in regard to Michigan butter not keeping well, are probably due in a great degree to the bad quality of the salt used in its manufacture. It is not unlikely, however, that this, being so common a fact, is in some instances made an excuse for carelessness and bad management in some of the processes of butter making.

The production of salt within the

State, is undoubtedly of very great importance, but if the people who buy and use it suffer a loss in consequence, it becomes a question whether we are on the whole benefited. The sait manufacturers may not at present concern themselves about the matter. As long as their sait sells, their chief object is accomplished. It cannot be supposed that all the complaints against Saginaw salt are the result of prejudice; though it is not intended to assert that no good salt is made there. Such is its reputation, however, that people who want to make the best 'butter and cheese are afraid of it. Within the past season, we have heard proprietors of cheese-factories in this State, say they would upon no account use either Saginaw or Syracuse salt. The proprietor of a large butter dairy, who has been able to sell all his butter considerably higher than regular market rates, said he would not use Saginaw salt for a day if he were offered a year's supply gratis. The English Ashton salt, purchased in New York, is used in those dairies, though of course at a much greater cost than would be incurred for that made at

Syracuse or Saginaw.

There was formerly great trouble in regard to the Syracuse salt, and the New York Legislature was obliged to adopt measures to guarantee its quality. It the dairy salt made at Syracuse, is equal in quality to any made in the world.—
There are two kinds which have a high reputation; one called "Onondaga Factory Filled" salt, and the other "Excelsior Mills" salt. The Utica N. Y.,

Herald states that several analyses which have been made of the former kind, show it to be purer and better than the Ashton salt. It seems from the paper referred to, that many of the New York cheese and

butter dairies have latterly been using this "factory filled" salt. "It is possible," says the *Herald*, "that some dairymen, to avoid expense, still use the common barrel salt, but if they do, it is unwise, and at a risk of injuring the product of the dairy,"
The paper from which we quote, gives an account of what seems to have been

a very fair comparative test of the qualities of the Onondaga factory filled and the Ashton salt. Samples of the two kinds were sent to some of the best butter-makers of several counties of few of the many articles composing our stock sylvania, with instructions that two tubs of butter from each dairy, were to be sent to the late exhibition of the New York State Agricultural Society, at Buffalo; one tub from each dairy to be saited with Ashton and the other with Onondaga salt, the same quantity being used in each case. The examination of the butter was made by a committee appointed by the Society above named—the knowledge of the kind of salt used in the respective tubs being witheld from the committee till after the decisions were made. The commit-

"We pronounce in twenty-five cases the butter cured with the factory filled salt made at the New York mills, Syracuse, to be the best as compared with its alternate package cured in the same dairy with Ashton salt. In five cases the Ashton cured butter was the best. We have no doubt that for the preservation of butter, the factory filled dairy salt has no superior."-Lansing (Mich.)


