

A GOOD LAW,-Under the provisions of a law approved April 13, ultimo, relating to the collection of taxes in the Borough of Wellsboro, the old system of collecting borough and school rates is abolished. Hereafter the Treasurer of the borough is constituted the Receiver of Taxes, to whom all moneys are to be directly paid over by the tax payer. We have not examined the law in detail, but believe the important features of the law are :-- The Treasurer to be a Receiver of Taxes : notice of the amount of tax assessed to every taxable to be given as soon as the duplicates are made out, and days of appeal stated therein ; all appeals and claims for abatewent to be submitted in writing, and no applications for abatement received after the last appeal day named in the notice ; all persons paying their taxes within thirty days from the last day of appeal, will be entitled to a deduction of five per cent. Persons neglecting to pay over to the Receiver of Taxes within a time fixed, notice of

which is to be given, must pay costs of collecting in addition to the tax. These are some of the chief features of the law. We propose to publish it in full as soon as a copy of it can be furnished. This law seems to us to be a step, in the right


