San Francisco, May 7.—The bark Comet, from the Sandwich Islands, brings accounts of a terrible volcani eruption by Mauna Loa, which began its demonstrations on March 27. On the 28th, 100 earthquake shocks were the 28th, 100° earthquake shocks were felt, and during the two weeks following to April 18, 2,000 earthquake shocks occurred. At Waischina the earth opened in many places, and a tidal wave 60 feet high rose over the tops of the cocoa trees a quarter of a mile inland, sweeping human beings, houses, and everything moyable before it. A terrible shock prostrated churches and houses, and killed many persons. In all, one hundred lives were lost, beside a thousand horses and cattle. The craters vomited fire rock, and lava, and a river of red-hot lava, five or six miles long, flowed to the sea at the rate of ten files per hour, destroying everything before it, and forming an island in the sea.
