THE WEST. - Mr. C. D. Chapman, of Sullivan township, who went to Iowa in June, and passed off pleasantly. Silver presents were 1867, on his late visit to this county gave us the following facts concerning the West, which we av before our readers for the information of such as may be attacked with western fever : Mr. Chapman visited Michigan with the intention of settling there if it suited him. He went into the Southern part of the State, and found the soil sandy and wet, and the climate unhealthy. He then went through Northern Indiana, which is low and swampy, into Illinois, which he pronounces as fine a country as he ever saw. The lands are hold at a high figure there, however, and only men of large capital can afford to stop there. Crossing the Mississippi at Burlipgton, he entered Iowa. He proceeded into the interior 75 or 100 miles where he found a rolling prairie country, very much like Illinois, very productive in grain and root crops. The soil is from two to ten feet in depth and raises fine crops of corn for a dozen years without manuring. The water is excellent, chiefly in wells, obtainable by digging from 18 to 20 feet. The timber is found on the "divides," fringing the creeks which divide the prairies. It is chiefly white oak, though walnut is not infrequent, and the timber bears a higher price in market than the prairie Prairie lands are sold at \$10 and \$20 per acre, unimpro-

It occupies less than four feet square of a room, and can be placed in the kitchen in cold weather, and in the cellar in warm weather and will hold fron 72 to 84 pans of milk. Th

shelves are made in skeleton form so as to allow the free circulation of air all around the pans. It has been proved that milk will raise more cream, and keep from four to six hours longer than on ordinary shelves.

Each shelf turns by itself independent of the other, so that the cream of the former milking is not disturbed by the removal or putting on of pans. The frame is such that it can be readiy covered with a cloth or gauze, effectually ex-cluding insects or dust. It is a complete arrange ment to dry fruit upon.
