## LETTER FROM IOWA.

CEDAR RAPIDS, Sept. 12, 1868. DEAR Adrianor:-Thinking it might be interesting to many of your readers to hear from the far North West, I send you an epitome of my journeyings and experiences since leaving Mansfield, and its pleasant surroundings. After a journey of a fortnight, via the great lakes, we found ourselves steaming up the Father of Waters from La Crosse to Winona. The scenery al the way is truly beautiful, vieing with that of the far famed Hudson. The eastern shore is mostly flat, while the western shows ranges of hills, and ledges of uncovered rocks all untouched by art. The hills rise from 500 to 1000 feet. Bold; rocky promontories push out close to the water; rear the summits of the wooded hills ledges of rocks with their perpendicular stratified sides, weather washed, present the appearance of ruined castles, walls, and towns overgrown, with vines, and bushes; these with the broad expanse of the river, and the bluffs present landscapes varied and beautiful enough to make a sick man, for a time, forget his pains and lils and lose himself in the wonder workings of the Infinite. Four hours

ride, through this varied scenery of river, hills and dales, brings us to WINONA, SIt is a new western town of 9000 or 10,000 inhabitants. Here we were obliged to stop about a week to recruit ou wasted energies; but notwithstanding the excessive heat, a very unfavorable introduction to one of the worst hotels of the town, (there are good ones), and our extreme weakness, just recovering from a spell of severe hemorrhage of the langs—we received very favorable impressions of the place. The best building in the town is the School House, built of brick, with towers and Mansard roof at a cost of over \$50,000. Indeed I found it characteristic of the Minnesota towns, that the best build-ings are the School Houses. Not far from this, one of the three State Normal Schools of Minnesota is building, at a cost of \$100,000. It is a finer school building than I have seen in any of our Eastern cities, and will with its fine architectural effect, form a lasting monument to the foresight of the founders of our young giant sister State in proof our young giant sister peace ... viding thus early, for the training of teachers. The her common school teachers. school is now under the direction of Prof. W. F. Phelps, as Principal, occupying rented apartments in waiting fo the most ample rooms and equipments of the State Normal, and is doing good work. Minnesota—praise be to her!—has already appropriated more toward the education of her teachers, than has Penn'a. Her Legislature has already given to the aid of this school, (and she has two others under her care), over 860,000, besides a permanent annual appropriation to each of her Norma Schools of \$5000. Had we in Mansfield the benefit of an appropriation, like this last we would think it no trouble to keep our heads above water. Let us for it yet. Pennsylvania though slow is generally sure to come out on the right side. If we could only get a galvanic battery, or something else to open the eyes of our legislators, it

would save much anxiety and hard la-bor on the part of the true friends of education, and would prove a God-send THE WHEAT FIELDS. Leaving Winona by rail we wended hither and thither for 10 or 12 miles to ascend the bluffs, when the most beautiful ralling prairie covered with waving golden wheat greeted the eye, far out as it could reach. The same rich scene of a sea of golden wheat almost ready for the harvest continued through Winona, Olmstead and Dodge Counties until we are stopped in Mantorville, the county seat of the latter county. It is a pleas-ant little inland town of over 1000 inhabitants, built on nearly the highest prairie lands of Southern Minnesota. Here, finding friends, we stopped to try the effect of the "lifegiving air" of the "Asylum for consumptives." A few weeks stay here found my health so much improved, that from being able to totter across the room on my arrival I could walk a mile and back without any feeling of weariness. It was then truly a luxury to ride over the prairie drink in the rich scenery, snuff the pure breeze, shoot prairie chickens watch the gophers in their curious zy rations, and maneuvers, &c., and ther go back and dream it all over again free as one can be from the cares and anxi ties of life. But the wheat! the wheat! One would almost think there were enough to supply all the hungry mouths for a year to come.
