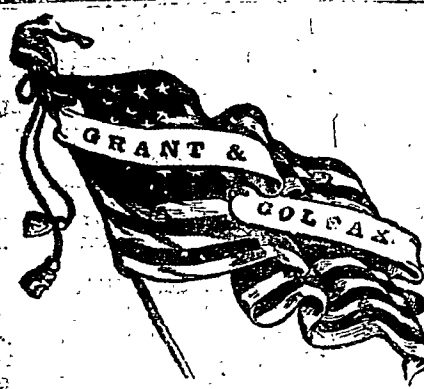

The 1860 Curtin majority in the State was 42,161. The majority for Lincoln, in November following, was 69,618, showing a gain on majority of 27,457.

The aggregate vote for Curtin was 282,403. The aggregate vote for Lincoln was 283,030—a gain of 6,627 on the vote of October.

The aggregate vote for Foster (Dem.) was 230,250. The vote for Douglas and Breckinridge in November was 238,412—showing a falling off of 21,827 votes from the vote of October.

We have a right to assume that there will be an increase of the Republican and a falling off of the Democratic vote next Tuesday.

Tioga county gave Curtin a majority of 2,816 in 1860, and Lincoln had a majority of 2,477 in November following.

The vote for Curtin was 4,137; that for Lincoln was 4,764—a gain of 607.

Foster's vote was 1,831, and Breckinridge's 1,277—a loss of 54.

It is not too much, then, to ask for a majority of 3,600 for Grant & Colfax next Tuesday. Forward to win!
