whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An act to regulate the General Elections of this Commonwealth," enacted on the 2d day of July, 1829, it is enjoined on the 19 to the public notice what officers are to be elected with therefore I, JEHOME B. POTTER, High Sherin of Tioga County, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the Electors of Tioga County, that a General Election will be held throughout the county on the 1st Tuesday of November, next, being the third day thereof, at the several districts within said county.

Ward, house of William L. Thomas, Union, house of John Irvino. At which time and places the qualified electors of Flogu county will vote for twenty-six persons for elect-ors for President and Vice-President of the United States.

It is further directed that the meeting of the Return Judges at the Court House, Wellsbord, to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the said election, that being the 6th day of November.

I am by said act further directed to give notice that every person, except Justices of the Peace, who shall hold office or appointment of trust or profit under the government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or accut, who is or who shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary departments of this State, or of any incorporated district; and also that every member of Cougress, and of the select ercommon council of any cityl commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, in spector, or cierk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or any other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

In accordance with the act of Assembly of March In accordance with the act of Assembly of March 1860, regulating the manner of voting at all elections I further state for the intermation of voters that all State officers will be voted for on a single slip of paper labeled "State;" and all county officers, including member of Congress, Senator, and members of Assembly, will be voted for on a separate bailot, and labeled "County," each class to be deposited in separate ballot-boxes. For instructions in regard to the organization of boards of election, etc., see act of Assembly of 2d July, 1839 pamphlet haw, page 219; likewise contained in a practical digest of the election laws of this Commonwealth, jurnished at every place of holding general elections, page 80, etc.
