The true way lies in educating the mass of voters; and no way is so cheap or effective. tive as through newspapers. No family can afford to be without one. It is the great educator of the day. Aside from the general entertainment and useful information imported by a live newspaper, it is, in a political sense, an engine of immense power. A fearless and able paper, battling for Manhoods Right, will secure not only the head of the family, but the sons, to the side of Freedom and justice. I believe these are truths which none will deny, and Impleat to good men to apply them

practically.
Get up clubs of newspapers in every neighborhood. First, get every man to take his own county party paper and pay for it. But don't stop then. Have him subscribe for one or more large weekly, that shall supply him with more mental pabulum in one week than a country newspaper, whose contents are necessarily, and properly too, made up mainly of matters of local interest, can in three months. I do not believe there are to exceed

five townships or boroughs in this county in which a club of fifty or more copies of Weekly Tribunes, costing only one dollar each, cannot be obtained. Many places much larger, numbers can be secured. Here we take over three times that number. I speak of the Weekly Tribune because, all in all, I deem it the best paper published. Men may not like Horace Greeley-in some gs i cannot agree with him—but The Tribune is not Horace Greeley. Too many suppose the death of Greeley would be the death of The Tribune. It would live right on, a power in the land as it now is, and although we might miss the sturdy blows he is ever giving for liberty and justice, yet we would find the great paper beckoning the people on towards truth. In my judement an honest sincere man, who is seeking to know the right, politically, who can carefully read the Weekly Trimme for one year, and and he deaming into the correct path, is well high past hope; certainly intemperate speeches 'campaign (documents') cannot

move him.

ARE OUR FEET PROPERLY CLOTHED: It is somewhat surprising that, with all our boasted improvements, we have not yet produced a proper covering for the foot. Barbarous people, if their cli-mate admits, go with bare feet or wear sandals, covering only the sole of the foot. We, however, encase the whole foot and a portion of the leg, in a ma-terial almost imperforatably hard and rigid. The color and polish of our boots are directly calculated to attract the sun's rays; and the enamel on patent leather, and the blacking on calf-skin, tend to harden and solidify the substance, closing the pores and making air tight cases for the portion of the body which exudes more perspiration than any other, and is subjected to a greater strain. Our boots in summer parboil our feet in a warm bath, and in inter freeze them in an icy envelope. It is doubtful if wet feet are, in themselves, very conductive to disease, some medical men to the contrary notwithstanding; but cramped confine-ment of the feet, in an icy cold envelope, generated by perspiration and chilled by the external atmosphere, thus shutting the imprisoned feet almost air-tight, is as unhealthy as it is uncomfortable. For hot weather, there is hardly any shoe so agreeable as that introduced within the past three or four years, known as the army shoe, and extensively used by the base ball players. It is of heavy canvas and unblacked leather. It is cool and renankably easy to the feet. The texture of the canvas allows the escape of the per-piration, and the color of the shoe does not attract the heat of the sun. It would seem that the plan of covering other portions of our bodies with material pervious to air might advantageously be extended to our feet. There is no natural reason why our feet should be so much less sensitive than our hands. They become indurated of their natural activity by long close confinement. The people of warm cli-mates, who use their toes as we do our fingers, and the bare-footed schoolboy, who pick up and throws pebbles with his feet, show that the foot of the civilized adult in our climate is a muchabused member. A more flexible and porous material for our boots and shoes might save us from many of those ter-rible annoyances which, in the form
