The entire debt of the county in Jan. 1868 was \$189.475.94. Upon this indebtedness the sum of \$32,345.95 was paid during the year, leaving the debt at present \$157. 129.95. In addition to payment of principal,

\$13.758.70 har been paid in interest-making a

total of disbursements on debt account of \$56.104-The ordinary expenses of the county during the year were, exclusive of County House account, about \$20,000. 
