and I submit, unexplainable upon any other understood theory. I contend that the full explanation of the tide 1,45 P. M., BALTIMORE EXPRESS, Sunday sexceptphenomena requires something more than the attraction of the sun and moon and that the vital functions analogous to the animal supplies that reqvisition.

The subject of the tides has always been attended with difficulty; upon the commonly accepted theory. In a work on the subject now before me is appended this note—"The theory of the tides, a subject of great difficulty, has been elaborately treated by Laplace in the 4th Book of the Mecanique Celeste" to which I refer the reader for the most powerful reasoning in favor of the commonly received Theory.
But when he shall have thoroughly studied that, or any other work on the same subject, in saying that it is a dif-ficult subject to explain on the common

theory, he will but give expression to the thought of every student of the Tides. I would like to go into a full discussion of the subject on my theory, but it would require more space than a newspaper could afford.

In this connection let me refer to remitting springs and wells.
