#### Letter from "Wanderer." FORT SANDERS, WYOMING TER,

May 25, 1869. Though you have seen ere this thro' the Eastern papers, that the Pacific Railroad is completed, and fully ap-preciate the magnitude of the undertaking that has bound together the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, it might interest the readers of your valuable paper, to speak of the great work, and the country thus thrown open to the admiration of tourists, emigrants, and gold-seekers. No longer need emigrants slowly wend their way with ox-teams across these vast praries, running the risk of meeting Indians, running the risk of meeting Indians, and loosing their hair, all necessity for such a mode of travelling, is now done away. The last rail is laid, the golden spike has been driven, and the prophecy of Benton has been fulfilled. He said when they first commenced building Railroads in the United States, that "the Rocky Mountains would form to harrier to the extension of the form no barrier to the extension of a Railroad from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans." On the 10th of May, at five minutes past three o'clock, P. M., the last blow was given, and that prophecy fulfilled.
