The Block House Settlement.

Where is it? Not as remote as here totore upposed, as, in the year 1844, a very ardent politician not 30 miles fron hence, in an appeal to his neighbors on the eve of the Presidential Election, declared that if such a man as ——— was elected President he would leave the fuiled States and go to the Block House! But, as free schools have had their happy influence over the commuinties of our now free country, geography and local history are better understood. On passing hy private conveyance over the well known stage road a few weeks since, from Troat Run Station up Troat Run, on arriving at the northern crest of that branch of the Alleghany monntains known as the Laurel Hill, at once was opened to our view the now extensiye agricultural region, composed of valley, valleys, intervals and undulations, known as Block House Valley. For miles spread out to the view the extensive fields of grain, meadows, or chards, with their full accompaniment of herds of cattle, sheep, &c., and near-ty equidistant, churches and school houses. My traveling companion, having traveled generally through the continent of Europe, said he had seldom if ever had such an extensive and delightful view, even from the mountains of Switzerland or the heights of the ancient Alps, and certainly none as he was now viewing below the abode of a free and infelligent people. HISTORY. But little is known of the country prior to 1781, when the district line which passes over the Block House bridge was ran for division line between Survey Districts No. 17 & 18 .- The greater portion of the Lands in Block House Valley were granted by the State to Literary and religious' Institutions by warrants issued in 1785 and signed in 1786 & 7. In the early part of 1792 Col. Williamson commenced the construction of a wagon road from the west branch of the Susquehanna northward to reach the lands, and open settlements on the lands of English companies, such as Poultney, Cazenovia, and Horn-by, for the former of which he was agent, situated in Stuben Allegany, &c, &c, Counties, State of New York, Owing to the hostile attitude of the Indians westward, being prior to the Treats of Greenville, 1795, it was deemed advisable to erect some fort for the protection and security of those ngaged in the construction of the road. It was constructed in the form of many of the Block houses on the frontiers, matched logs, and loop holes for small arms, &c. It subsequently formed a part of the structure of the Block House Tavern. It so remained until 1841 when it was removed to give place to the Hotel Building known by its name. The Block House was on the ground of the S. E. corner of the Hotel. It was the nucleus for the subsequent set. tlement. It consisted of the Tavern and four or five settlers until 1804, when several settlers came on again in 1812. 
