just received, comprising every thing usually kept in a It cannot truthfully be denied that the season just closed has been an exceedingly prosperous one for all who made their milk into cheese. It would be a sin for our dairymen to find fault, Not only has the yield been uncommonly abundant, but prices have ruled higher than any one, at the opening of the season; could have reasonably expected. The average price per pound for the season cannot he under sixteen cents, while many factories have realized an average of seventeen cents, and some of even eighteen cents. Yet, at these really high prices, our very large p make has found asready market and gone into consumption, leaving no heavy stock to remain in the handsof holders at the opening of the next season. The results are anomalous. An unprecedentedly large yield has, been consumed at high prices, leaving the future

prospect clear and promising. How shall we account for this mexpected result? Our answer to it is that we made better cheese last season than ever before, and good cheese not only sells more readily and for a better price but goes more rapidly into consump tion, because more palatable and nutritious. This, we believe, is the true moral of last season's experience. It has demonstrated that a good article, in increased abundance, will readily go into consumption, at a comparatively high price-a fact never before demonstrated, simply because circumstances had not been favorable—simply because we have never before had so much good cheese to go Into consumption, in any one season. And it is our belief that. had our cheese been unusually poor, instead of unusually good, the market would have been early glutted, prices would have gone down below a remunerative point, and the business for the Spring is Long a-Coming I coming year would have been well-nigh ruined. There would now be on hand a heavy stock of poor cheese, which nobody would want to eat at any price, and which would go into consumption only because forced into consumption, by compelling cheese consumers to cat it or eat none. Holders, with a lot of poor cheese on hand, would reluctantly lav in more stock before they had got rid of the old; and the low price and abundance of poor cheese would keep back in first hands, and keep down prices, for good cheese, which would be , still further depressed by a constant accumulation of stock. It is only by tak-. ing this view of what might have been, that American dairymen can justly appreciate the immense advantages which they have derived from the improved quality of last year's heavy production

Another point in last year's, experience should be considered. The high prices in the early part of the season induced our dairymen to send forward their cheese as fast as ready for market, instead of holding it for a higher figure. The result was, that our cheese went immediately into consumption, and was eaten up almost as fast as made. | Thus the market was kept clear, an active demand was kept up, and there was no accumulation of stock. Had our dairymen generally held back for higher prices, consumption would have been retarded-for cheese cannot be caten before it is sent to market; stock would have accumulated, and this accumulation would have defeated the very end aimed at, by causing a decline instead of a rise in prices; and we should now find ourselves with a heavy stock of cheese on our hands, (which we had refused to allow to go into consumption,) prices would be low, and the prospects for the coming year would be as discouraging as they are now encouraging. The philosophy of holding for higher prices any product abundant as cheese, is utterly false, and defeats its own ends by checking consumption and causing a rapid accumulation of stock. It is only in articles of limited supply, which it is possible to monopolize, that anything can be made by a general policy of holding to force a rise. The true policy is to supply the current demand, at current prices, and, by encouraging consumption, make a demand equal to or greater than the current supply.-This, and this alone, will put up the price of an article as abundant as cheese. The moral of the past season's experience is, then, that we should make a

prime article, which everybody will relish, at home and abroad, and thereby encourage consumption and increase the demand, while we freely supply that demand, at current prices, and thus enlarge the market for the article which we have to sell. This liberal and who may come from that vicinity to CORNING enlightened policy is the only one that to buy will pay. A narrower and more selfish one, as recommended by some, will not only defeat the immediate aim to force up prices, but retard the development of the dairying business, and diminish its profits, by checking the growth of the demand for dairy products. We must encourage consumption, by making an article so tempting that everybody will eat it freely, and furnishing it in abundance at a reasonable price. Thus will we establish a market for cheese that will always make cheese making profitable.

But, ask some are we not in danger of overdoing cheese-making? We answer, no-not if we make an article good enough. Many new factories are going up, it is urged, which will necessarily greatly increase the yield, and perhaps make it exceed the demand .-Again, we say, if the quality is all right, there is, as yet, no danger. Besides, though the building of new factories may somewhat increase the yield it will not increase it as much as many suppose-for while it increases the A LARGE DISCOUNT ON PRICES amount of factory cheese, it will diminish the yield of private dairy cheese, which is usually poor and hangs on the hands of holders, clogging the market. | we thus make it for their interest to come to u The effect of erecting new factories, therefore, will not be so much to increase the product of American cheese, as to improve its quality-a consummation at all times devoutly to be wished. Hence, we believe the improvement in the quality of our cheese, by the extension of the factory system, will more than counterbalance the effect of the consequent increase in quantity. Viewing the matter in this light, we believe that more factories will redound to our advantage; and we shall be glad, when only factory cheese, of the best quality, or dairy cheese of equal quality, is made. When that time arrives, everybody at home will eat cheese, and the demand will have increased manifold,
