A recent tour around the triangle of Tiogs county, of which Wellsboro, Tioga, and Mansfield occupy the three corners, has forced upon my mind the unwelcome fact, that, in the important matter of care of live stock the farmers of our region are a quarter of a century behind the times. The almost entire absence of shelter of any kind, for cattle, is a marked, and most unpleasant feature. Honorable exceptions, there are few; but they may be told upon the fingers of two hands, certainly. The general rule is, a bare, bleak yard, or stack, in open field, where the poor beasts droop shivering, or crouch beside the barn, (and not erything desirable, both in style and quality, and seldom on the north side of that even shall be pleased to see our old customers and all are they yarded,) or, the open fence, for the trifle of shelter these afford.-How they love to crave this warmth and shelter, is shown by their always seeking the sunniest and most protected spot, accessible to them. Some sheds also, I noticed, wide open to the "frozen North," where storms had their full course, and snow-drifts lay piled up. What possible good use these are, it is hard to guess. Such farmers are blind to their own interests, as well as to the sufferings of the poor brutes, dependent on them; for it is now well ascertained, that the animal heat, which is the life, is sustained with much less food, which is the fuel of the system where the creature is sheltered from the cold and wet.

I do not advocate stabling cattle; usually I think they do better when allowed to move about at pleasure; but comfortable, warm sheds, open to the sunny South, and dry, clean yards, they have a right to; and he is a poor farmer, to say the least, who provides his cattle no protection from the piercing winds, and storms of snow and sleet, which our mildest winters bring. 
