Where the Wages Go-Sober Thoughts for Workingmen. [From the New York Evening Post, Jan. 8.] Why is it that so many of the fami-

lies of the laboring men in our towns and cities live in such a poor beggardly way, and in so many damp, dark base ments, and up in such close, confined ricketty old attics? Many of the heads of these families receive good wages and get their pay every week or month regularly. But where, in too many cases, do their wages go to? Not to the banker, the grocer, the butcher, the merchant; they go for strong drink, ale and beer, which do not strengthen the physical man. Franklin taught the printers of London that cold water was better than ale; aud cold water has lost none of its virtues in 140 years.

The cost of tippling is in the aggregate enormous. The inquiry is often made how are so many drinking houses sustained? Let us see. Twenty men, at 30 cents a day, will pay one of the "tippling shops" \$2,190 a year. A man who pays 30 cents a day for "drinks,", pays \$109.50 a year. This is the interest on \$1,564 at 7 per cent., at simple interest. This sum, 30 cents a day, amounts in ten years to \$1,171.95. All this is wasted, paid out for "an enemy that steals away a man's brains," and robs him and his family of every comfort. Intoxicating liquors give neither strength to the body, vigor to the mind resolution to the will, elevation to morals nor dignity to character. Strong drink drags a man down from his high estate, depraves all his appetites, and leaves him in want and misery, the

The constant use of intoxicating liquors make hard times for many a man thus, a family of five persons will consume four barrels of flour a year, or 1,056 pounds of bread. This is nearly three pounds a day. -Good flour can be bought at \$7|a barrel; four times seven make \$28; and thirty cents a day for drinks is \$109.50, or \$82.50 more per year than the bread for a family of five persons costs. "But," says A., "I only take two drinks a day," Very well you pay; then for your drinks \$78 a year; only \$45 more than you pay for the bread consumed by your whole family, if it contains five persons. This sum would provide tea and coffee for them. Here, then, we see that the man who

mere wreck and semblance of a man.

pays even twenty cents a day for liquor spends a sum sufficent to supply his family with bread, ten and coffee for the year. Is itstrange that times are hardthat men complain of the Government, and charge that it oppresses them with onerous taxes? The above figures show how men tax themselves; and how they tax property too.

In 1868 the Inebriate Asylum cost the taxpayers of this city \$144,472.40. While the amount of the money paid by the city for flour for all hospitals, asylums, for the relief of the poor, was only \$102,

The outdoor poor cost the city, in 1868, \$122,228.64. How much of this could be charged to intemperance? The number of persons committed to the workhouse in this city in 1868 was 15.788. The commissioners say, "a considerable proportion of the committals is for intoxication." The police stations, the prisons, the almshouses. the penitentiary, the miserable homes, all tell of the work of intemperance.-. It is the great curse of the land—it feeds upon the wages of labor, and like the horseleech's daughter, "it ories give, give," until all is gone of health, character, life.

THE LARGEST HOG IN THE WORLD. -The American Republican, published at West Chester, says: On Monday last, Mr. Jefferson slaughtered the largest hog of which we have any record. The hog was a Chester White, and was two years and five months old. It measured six feet and ten inches from the root of the tail to between the ears. seven feet and three inches in girth just behind the fore legs, and seven feet and nine inches around the middle.-The head weighed 74 lbs,; and the weight of the whole hog, neatly dressed, was ten hundred and forty pounds. Good judges estimated that he would make six hundred pounds of lard! He was a good feeder, and we are assured or the last four months, he did not drink any water. It was purchased by Messers, Conner & Martin, at 12 cents Messers, Conner & Martin, at 12 cents per pound, making \$124.80. A pretty round sum for one hog. Some years ago the late Joseph Morgan killed a hog which weighed 1052 bs; but Mr. Shanger's hog dressed in the same manner weighed 1064. This is the largest hog


