**EARLY VEGETABLES.**  
The Rural New Yorker gives the following suggestions on raising early vegetables:  
**EARLY PEAS.**  
Get a few papers of the very earliest kind—say extra Early May. Select the "winning" days in February of March you can, and plant in a sheltered spot, as you desire to plant—say south-side of a fence row or wall—plant your peas thick, three inches deep, cover with warm, dry leaf mould or chip manure and on each side of the row lay corn stalks, piling them up a foot on each side so that they will not fall over on the row. Scatter straw lightly over the row so as not to fully exclude the sunlight. If very rough weathers in, (which will be the case, in all probability,) cover the rows with plank or boards until the rough weather is over. Remove when the snow shines warmly. In this way you can have a crop of peas in such ground in a few days of those planted at the usual time. The peas are quite hardy, as I have had them covered with snow when two inches high without injury, when protected as above directed.  
**CUCUMBERS.**  
Early in March procure some seeds about eight inches square, and four inches thick. Turn them over and under the soil so that the seed can be stuck in an inch or so deep. Plant only the "Early Frame." Set the seeds in a pit or hot-bed, if you have them; if not, set them in a shelf in a room where there is a fire; water with milk warm water occasionally. When the seeds get dry, and when warmer weather comes remove them to the garden and place small boxes a foot square, having neither bottoms nor tops over them. At night, until the young plants get "hardened" place a pane of glass over them. Remove the boxes as the ground and the air get warmed up, and you will have fine early cucumbers.  
**TOMATOES.**  
Sow in boxes of about two feet by one and a half, six inches deep in earth of the richest kind. Cover the seed half an inch deep. If you have a hot-bed, place this box in it; if not, set it in a sunny window. Water occasionally. When the plants are an inch or two high thin them out to about an inch apart. So soon as the weather is frosty, transplant in moderately good garden soil, not rich, as that would make fine vines, but poor fruit.  
**FROZEN PEAS.**—Some still, clear night Jack Frost will find his way into the ladies parlor or chamber, where she keeps her house plants, and, at the next morning the sweet peas will be as rigid as the artificial flowers on her bouquet. Now what shall be done? Don't hurry them into a warm room to thaw them by the side of a stove as you would a frozen chicken. Let them remain where they were frozen, close the window shutters or drop the curtains, so as to make the room quite dark; then sprinkle the plants with cold water; direct from the cistern and wait for the result. Do not allow the room to become warmer than 45 degrees for twenty-four hours. If a few drops of spirits of camphor are thrown into the dish of water before sprinkling, it will be all the better. Plants treated in this way, though frozen so badly, that water will freeze in drops on the leaves when sprinkled, yet by keeping the room dark and cool for an entire day, they will come out unharmed.  
**PRUNING.**—Injured trees, such as have been broken by storms, or otherwise, should have the ragged wood pared smooth. Those slightly injured, by mice and rabbits, will recover if earth be drawn up to cover the wound. If the bark completely gone, the only way to save the tree is to connect the bark below and above the wound by coils, inserted in the bark so as to span over the injured part.  
Pruning is to be done before growth begins. In pruning neglected trees, the object should be to get an open and well balanced head. Take care that a bed wound is not made by the falling of the limb when partly sawed off. Pare wounds smooth, and cover them with wax or paint, which may be tinted, to be less conspicuous.—*American Agriculturist.*  
**GREAT YIELD OF OATS.**—For the information of my brother farmers in Susquehanna County, I would mention my success last year in raising oats. About the last day of April I sowed one acre of ground to common oats, and the only way I have sown for ten years past, and from that acre I raised 81 bushels, weighing 37 lbs. per bushel, and 93 bushels and 21 lbs., weighing 32 lbs. per bushel. Bring on your Norway humberg, and beat that if you can.
