'She'-puts the room in order, and we get it ready to be ,rip up again: The same socks, the same washing, the same room every time. She has no successive jobs, no ferms, no pay day, no tally stick of life. She washes the same dish three hundred and sixty-five times every year. No wonder she breaks it and is glad of it! What, a re- of all kinds are cheaper than they have been in lief to say, 'I've done that dight'? Not only liave we washed dishes, but also we cooked and served and

helped eat a meal, (with 'bated appetite because of cooking) and now we are astounded at the number of thouligts, and steps, and acts, and processes involved in a very plain supper. And we had it, and with it came wisdom. Gentlemen all! We go into a room every lady can afford a new dress. and see a table ready set. It seems to us one thing—a supper. It is, in fact from fifty to two hundred separate hings, taken down one by one forms to use, and for 'her' to wash and put back whence they came. There is a plate of biscuit. To that plate of simplicity we we have a complete assortment and CHEAPER with our dwn hands and feet brought THAN EVER BEFORE. Gentlemen, we began at ten minutes of six and a quarter to eight we found ourselves triumphant—every thing cleared away except the dish cloth. You see we washed up the bread pan, the dish pan and the sink, scalding them all (and our fingers, too,) and dried them off with the dish cloth. Now where on earth can we go to wash out that dish rag? Not in the clean pan? Not over the crean, dry sink!

We stood aghaet for five minutes, and then wadded up the rag, round-like a ball, and tucked it into the far corner of the sink, and shut down the cover Our sink has a gover. But the rag, though hidden, was heavy on our conscience. 'She' never would have done so. We have seen dish-clothes, but how they washed them passes our skill. And so we said, 'she' is away, leaving us to thought and good resolutions. We shall be a wiser and a better man for at least two days after her return. And whenever we stop to think, shall rank a successful house-keeper and home mark as a worker second to none on a scale of achievement and deserving. Her services are like the air, the main and the sunshine, indispensible, yet too often enjoyed without thanks-giving.—Rev. T. K. Beecher.

TAKING, MILK TO THE FACTORY, -At a late meeting of the patrons of the Sycamore Cheese Factory, the proprietor, in the course of some excellent re-Marks on the above subject, said:
A large portion of the milk has been

brought to the factory in lumber wagons-the cans not sufficiently protected from the sun, and in almost all cases the morning's milk not sufficiently cooled. As a consequence we were troubled from the latter part of June to the first of September with the dread of all cheese makers, floating curds. Milk, after being carefully cooled, should be hauled to the factory, as far as practicable, upon spring wagons, and the cans during warln weather should 35,000 ROLLS of WALL PAPER always be covered with a thick woolen blanked, or buffalo robe, to protect then from the rays of the sun.

SOFT GINGERBREAD. - Pake one cup of molasses, two-thirdsof cup of water, one large tablespoonful of shortening, 1 teaspoonful of soda or 'saleratus, giuger to suit the taste, one cup of flour; bake slowly threequarters of an hour. It is much lighter and nicer to have the oven


