FRANCO-PRUSSIAN WAR NEWS.

The Tribune has the following from London, under date of the 21st inst; ; "A telegram from Berlin, which was received at the Embassy of the North German Confederation late last evenitg, announces that Marshal Bazaine, at the head of the French troops, made a most desperate effort, just at daybreak this morning, to cut his way through the Prussian investing line. He was met instantly by the Prussians, in great force, and, after three hours of desperate fighting, repulsed with a tremendous loss to the French. Bazaine was driven to the inside fortress of Metz, with his force greatly damaged."
The Tribune correspondent at the

Prussian headquarters gives the follow-ing account of the battle of Gravelotte: The battle fought to-day, the 18th began at 10 in the morning and lasted till after 9 this evening. Until noon it was an artillery duel. The French lines being stretched along the hills covering the two roads leading from Metz to Verdun, having on their right flank a farm house, known as La Villette, with a walled garden, held in great force a sunken road that led straight from Gra-velotte to the center of their position. "On the French left, the road wound over the crest of a hill on which twelve earthworks had been thrown up. Eight mitrailleuses, beside artillery, were posted to command every approach to this strong position, and their guns swept the valley reaching from Gravelotte, eastward, by which the Prussians had to advance. Behind this line of strong defense lay the forts St. Quentin, making the position apparently one of impregnable strength, and completely protecting the French rear.

"The position at first held by the Prussians was to the east of the French facing toward Metz, occupying the sou-thernmost road to Verdun, and reach-ing over the chain of hills lying be-tween Gravelotte and Rezonville. The result of the artillery contest was to compel the French to abandon their most advanced positions, and the line by which they hoped to cover both of the roads was pierced and driven back. "At noon the Prussians were able to push forward their artillery, the French guns proving unable to resist the weight of the Prussian fire. The Prussian batteries shortly after noon were in position on either side of Gravelotte, so that neither of the roads, which at that point branch off to Verdun north and southwesterly, were any longer open to the French army. I reached the field just as this forward movement of the Prusslans had been accomplished. The ground was favorable for a good view

portant to them tactically as well as strategically. c. "By 2 o'clock the French batterles covering the Verdun road from the north and east were silenced, and the Prussians had advanced so far from the south of that road as to occupy the farm house at Malmaison, a little northwest from Gravelotte. Twenty minutes later the French fire so slackened and wavered that the Prussian batteries were once more pushed forward, and took up a new position in front of Gravelotte. At 3:20 the Prussian cavalry went into action. They advanced un-der a hot fire from the French guns.— The attack was made in considerable force by the Uhlans, both curassiers and bussars; but they were at first without infantry support, and could make no serious impression on a position still naturally strong and still held in force by all arms of the French."

Another correspondent telegraphs from Pont-a-Mousson, on Sunday, 21st: "The French, in the battle of Thursday, were driven back to the forts of St. Quentin, where from the Prussian front they are still visible. The villages of Vionville, Flavigny, Rezonville and Gravelotte are much burned, and resemble slaughter houses. The fields are covered with dead Prussians. Their cavalry, while charging the French lines beyond Gravelotte, suffered much. "The vast numbers of dead French still on the battle field of Tuesday, show the battle of that day to have been as terrible for them as that of Thursday.

The Grown Prince is said to have returned toward Vitry. "There are many rumors of peace negotiations." King William's account of this battle says the French were cut off from Paris and driven back to Metz. A telegram from Pont-a-Mousson, of

August 19, reports: "Yesterday the Prussians won a brilliant victory near Gravelotte. The French were expelled from every position they held, thrown back upon Metz, and confined to a narrow territory around that fortress. They are com-pletely cut off from Paris. A Prussian army corps holds the railways from Metz to Thionville. The Prussian losses have been heavy,"

It is said the French loss during the week exceeds 50,000 killed, wounded and missing. The French claim a victory at Gravelotte.

A later account from King William, concerning the battle at Gravelotte on the 18th instant, says:

"About 8:30 P. M. fighting ceased gradually. Without this I should have acted as at Koniggratz. The troops have performed miracles of valor against an enemy equally brave, who withdraw

It is reported that the Empress is urging Napoleon to abdicate in favor of his son. Gen. Trochu is in supreme Defense, of which he is the head, have the fullest powers in all matters pertaining to the defense of the city .-Strasbourg is yet held in a state of siege by the Prussians. The general in command has driven out all non combatants, to husband the supplies of the city as far as he can.

The Tribune, speaking of the great battles before Metz, which seem to be the decisive battles of the war thus far, remarks as follows:

"The tactics of Sadowa were repeated at Gravelotte. The Prussians began the engagement with a divided army. or rather two armies moving from different directions, with orders to form junction behind the enemy's position.

Bazaine covered the point which the Prussians had selected as that upon which to converge, and actually lay be-tween the two armies which he had to fight. It was not until after nightfall that the junction was effected and the victory won; but it was then complete, and forced Bazaine into Metz, where it had all along been the design of the Prussians to confine him. The battle was purely defensive on the part of the French. None of the several bloody repulses of Prince Frederick Charles's attacks were signal enough to enable Bazaine to follow with an offensive movement to extricate himself, from his great danger. He held the strong positions of the field. The second line which he assumed was pronounced invulnerable, and the direct attack of Prince Frederick Charles would doubt less have failed to dislodge Bazaine, had not Von Steinmetz struck the right flank of the Freuch soon after nightfall. 


