When a pupil is made to understand that his or her advancement depends upon proficiency in the studies pursued. there is likely to be no lack of carnest, persistent effort. The young mind reaches out for expedients which shall promote the greatest progress, and thus the pupil begins to think for him or herself. There is never any substantial advance-

ment, without that systematic discipline which makes the pupil a thinker. It is idle to think only through the minds of others. Memorizing the thoughts of others, makes us mere copyists. Independent thinking inspires originality. We must make ourselves mediums en rapport with the one source of all inspiration. Pupils must do this to become scholars. Scholarship is the effect—it is the full fruition of pupilage. The labor of organizing this school will be




