THE FAIR.-The annual Fair of the lioga County Agricultural Society was hold at Wellsboro, on the grounds of the Park Association, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of hist week. Morning broke bright and beautiful, Wednesday, and all through the Fair the weather was fine. But oh how dusty! Never in all our experience at fairs, and trainings, and celebraions, and marches over dusty roads, had we ever experienced anything like it! Dust upon the hills, on the fields, the streets, the houses, all over the green trees and the withering leaves, in clouds along the highways and byways, upon the, late flowers and the parched grass-everywhere like social callers, who intrude themselves un wanted, it insinuated itself. In England, old Time, there was a perambulating court, established to do justice on the spot at country fairs, which was called curia pedia pulverizati, court of dusty feet: Here we had the dusty feet, and we did justice as expeditiously and well as we could inder the circumstances.

The Executive Committee had made additions to the hall, and other improvements, which amo't to \$100, or more. Great credit is due those members of the committee who took these matters in charge. There was so much going on about town, that it was extremely difficult to secure assistance, and it was only by the efforts of these gentlemen that the necessary arrangements were made in time. Col. A. E.
