The Public Lands and the Republican

The measures and policy of the Republican party with reference to securing the public domain for actual settlement, must necessarily form one of the subjects which the people will discuss on the eye of a new appeal for their confidence and support. They will ask for the party that has been faithful to la-bor interest in the disposition of the public lands, and they will study the indications of the future in regard to them. The subject is one of great importance, of course, irrespective of any merely party triumph, for it is intimately connected with national development, with finance, with labor, and with trade. But if the Republican record is such that the party can claim to have acted usefully, and in the interest of the laboring man, it has a right to the consideration which the fact de- Which has just been received at the new Store o mands. One of the first acts of the Republican

Congress, after some necessary steps to resist the rebellion for which the Democratic party was largely responsible, was the passage of the Homestead law. Under that measure the public domain was offered to the laboring man na practically a free gift—the payment of ten dollars and actual settlement being the only conditions towards the possession of 160 acres of land. At the same time the only policy by which this great opportunity for labor could be realized was not neglected. Land grants have been conceded to aid in the construction of lines of communication, by which vast territories, little else than an untraveled wilderness. were opened up for the advance of civilization and the creation of wealth. Thousands of new homes have been erected in localities before practically unknown. The possession of the Con tineut, with all its wealth of soil, of climate, and of mineral production, tus by means of these assisted lines been given to the people. And when these modes of cheap and easy transit wore established, or provision for their establishment made, Republican leaders entered upon the second stage of the process by which the industry and enterprise of the laboring man might be still further secured. The work of opening the vast interior had been assisted, and further development of railroad and canal enterprise might now be left to individual States and territories. The time had arrived for such a resolution as Congress passed in its iast session, that the public lands of the United States should be held for the exclusive purpose of securing homesteads to actual settlers, under the Homestead and Pre-emption laws, sub-

educational purposes. Here, then, is what the Republican party has done and proposes to do for the working men of this country. It enacted laws by which the public domain was declared the property of citizens who were desirous of securing homes for themselves, and imposed conditions for the acquisition of such that were of merely nominal character. It encouraged the enterprise by whose means the vast regions waiting for settlement could be rendered accessible. And when these latter had been constructed or sufficiently advanced, further grants were suspended, and the immense remaining domains reserved for the use and benefit of the people at large. 
