Wellsboro Union Graded SCHOOL.

A. C. WINPERS, A. M. SUPERINTENDENT OF GRADED SCHOOLS,
and Principal of High School.

IT is the determination of the Directors to make the course of instruction as thorough and systematic as can be found in the State. The best advantage of the pupils departing from the pupil must master every year's allotted work, before being admitted to the next higher.

The best method of employing in every department, the most appropriate methods of instruction used, and the best care of exercise over the pupils in school and out.

The High School offers these advantages:
The Principal is a graduate of the Rochester University, New York, a gentleman of large experience in the best conducted schools of the country, who has spent two years in Europe and speaks German, French and Italian. His qualifications for the principal position are attested by his *Fine Arts and the Ancient Languages*. Instruction in *Higher Mathematics*, the Sciences, Book keeping and Music, will be equal to that of the best academies.

The Board hope to soon be able to secure instruction in *Painting and Drawing*, by a lady who has advanced several years' teaching under the best masters in Germany, and who has profited in the Galleries of Berlin, Dresden. Munich and Florence.

This school is the *cheapest school*. The Board intend to obviate all objections to the cheapness of our schools, as far as possible; no salaries or extra pay, except such as may be paid to full teachers, will be done to every pupil. Tuition is free to all within the old borough limits, and to those at abroad at half rate. To private families from \$3 to \$4 per week.
