PATTENING HOGS.

The best time to commence fattening is in the months of September, October and November, and the worst in December, January and February. A certain amount of food is needful to keed the animal warm when the thermometer is at zero. All this is saved when itstands between thirty and sixty degrees. In addition to this, the absolute loss of food by freezeing to the spout and trough, and the inevitable mixing with snow and slush is never lem (ordinarily) than five per cent., not to say anything about the trouble and cost of continually thawing frozen swill, and bringing it to the temperature that will be the most acceptable to the uncomfortable and semi-torpid animal.

· The eastern method is to commence fattening by boiling potatoes, pumpkins, apples, or other vegetables, and mixalittle bran, shorts or provender with the cooked vegetables when hot, thus thoroughly cooking the meal.-It is then placed in tube or vate, and allowed to slightly ferment, when it is ready for use. The amount of meal is gradually increased until near killing time, when meal weel cooked is given alonė.

The meal is composed of oats, buckwheat and corn, or any other coarse grain, or of any two of them, generally treated, they fatten much faster than on dry corn and at much less expense. It costs more labor, but at a season when it can be well spared, and it is

will recompensed. The English system is still more diversified. They use all kinds of vegetables potatoes, turnips, carrots, beets, peas, beaus, barley and oats; the grains steamed or ground; the vegetables cooked and mixed with slop from the house, dairy, distillery, brewery, etc. Even grass and clover is cut and inixed with the feed, and almost every subsubstance of light cost and any nutriment is nicely prepared and finds a ready market in the maw of the onini-

verous hog. A celebrated English breeder gives the following directions: give them a variety of meal, such as wheat, maize, barley, and whatever is most conven ient to mix together. Have it all wetted with hot water, and sprinkle it with salt. What is miked one day is used the next, thus giving sufficient time to allow the food slightly to ferment, and cool sufficiently to feed with. This is our winter plan, but in summer we mix all with cold water, and feed with cold food. Between meals give them whole make, and mangold wurtzel or sweeds cut small, a little coal and soil for Men and Boys, ard varied and complete. We occasionally and allow them plenty of occasionally, and allow them plenty of clean water. When pigs are put up for fattening we find nothing better to feed them with than barley and maize meal, mixed together into slops, water always kept by them, and a little man-gold cut for them occasionally. It is very beneficial to wash and brush them

as often as convenient. This is quickly done by experienced hands, and will amply re-pay the trouble, but throughthe northwest, it is the practice to feed ear form in a dry state. It is not the best economy, and yet corn is so easily produced, and it is so handy to feed, especially in cold weather, and when the hogs have been properly summered, and their teeth and health good, success is so certain, that it will, doubtless be a long time before it will be bandoned. If the corn was soaked, steamed, or ground, it would give you. a better return, and if mixed with cooked vegetables, still better. From the Western system of feeding, ten bushels of corn will increase the weight of a good hog about one hundred pounds, and sometimes more. So the comparand sometimes more. The very common practice of leaving a quantity of food before them constantly, so as to be sure they have enough, is very wasteful, and very bad policy; so is irregular feeding. Strict regularity as to times of feeding, quality and quantity of feed, are very described country; further we do affirm that no man eliable. Twice feeding each day is can undersell us unless they receive goods by batter than three times: but whatever the batter than three times; but whatever the number of times adopted, they should be every day alike, and at about the same time each day. Once giving too little—then too much sometimes omitting a meal, then giving an extra one, or feeding at irregular times any of these practices will detract materially from the value of the pork barrel.-Somerset Beporter.




