WHITE DAISY IN MEADOWS.—The white daisy is getting to be the principal pest of our dality land. Unlike the thistle (Canada), it thrives in grass land, and deteriorates when much plowed. Hence, a fallow is good for it. But the grass crop may be made an advantage over the white dalay. Get an early heavy crop of the June clover and cut early, and what daisles may be in, will not only be comparatively of small amounterbut afford good field tecond only to clover, and preferred even by some to that plant! Plaster the clover and if ashes in large quantities are used, all the better-and there will be another fine crop, of clover principally-the

daisles affording good feed as before. Here is no loss, but, if anything? an autual gain. It is true, we would rather to have the daisies out because they are a weed. But in meadows they are of no barm, particularly in which a cut bearing Two crops should be taken, and the aftermath will find them harmless.

Orchard grass may take the place of olover with success, as it is as early and grows as rapidly as the clover. But be careful of the second cuttings, and cut as soon as the dalsles appear. Cut (at each time) when all is in a tender condition, before the grass is in full blossom,-when just getting into blossom is the time.

In this way the dalay can be kept down and harmless. In pastures it is different; here the plow would do well to summer fallowing the crop of weeds making a good manure bed. This is the best way to treat pasture land overrun with daisies. Now is the time to see to these things.—Fi G. in Runal New York Administration 1. 18 Yorker. ----


