THE INSANE.
The following statistics of the Penn-
sylvania are well worthy of
careful reading:
It is between the ages of 20 and 30
years that we would guard most care-
fully against excitement, for more per-
sons than become insane than in any
other decade of life. Men, it appears,
get more of the wear and tear of life, or
do not stand it as well as women, for
out of 2,918 patients only 1,264 were
of the fair sex. Widowers stand their
grief better than widows, for there were
159 of the latter and only 74 of the
former. This is the more remarkable,
as women patients were, on the whole,
less numerous. Out of a total of 2,918,
only 1,264 were women. The numbers
of married and single persons were as-
tatingly near equal, 1,342 were mar-
ried and 1,343 were single, leaving a
minority not sufficiently large to found
an inference on. The Women's Suffrage
orators, might gain an argument from
the fact that a majority of the
women were housekeepers, 618 of whom
succumbed under their cares, while
there were only 14 teachers and 25
seamstresses. Doctors would point a
moral with the circumstances that the
cause assigned for the largest number of
cases was ill health. Evidence ap-
propriate to the statement of fact made,
that Americans live too fast, and that
the race is wearing out, might be found
in the large number of native-born
Americans among the unfortunate
works of humanity, of whom 2,318
were of native birth, while of excitable
Hibernians there were the small num-
ber of 270, of beer-drinking Germans 160
and of French, contained, only 51.
Perhaps the most surprising item, and the
most contrary to received opinions, is
the preponderance of out-of-door work-
ers, of 1,654 crazy men, there
were 640 who had been farmers, and
489 who had been laborers, while of
representatives of brain-racking pro-
fessions there were but 76 in all, 19 of
them physicians, 25 teachers, 10 preach-
ers, 16 lawyers, and 2 editors.
Not long since, says Paul Parélli, I
paid a visit to one of the prominent
lunatic asylums of our country, and
was very much interested in beholding
the different forms of insanity there
illustrated. But the subjects, which
engaged my attention most were those
whose wanderings were of a literary
character, and I found many of this
kind in the institution. The gentle-
man in charge, whom the keeper in-
formed me were the exponents of the
two different schools of poetry—the in-
tellectual and the emotional. Both of
them had followed literature as a pro-
fession for many years, but never hav-
ing been able to make anything out of
it, grew desperate and got insane. They
buried their professional rivalries
the moment they met upon the coun-
ten ground of lunacy, and were now
to be seen daily walking arm-in-arm
throughout the institution, composing
poems and giving copies thereof (gratis)
to whomsoever solicited them.

One of them, who called himself the
Great Psychologist, gave me the fol-
lowing, entitled "The Soulless Soul":
Maudering logs, climbing unheeded thro'
the glimmering darkness,
Bourneless slinkies searching for cobwebs pear-
ly with mullage blue,
Red-eyed, in dreads of infuriate fancy, glows
now heartily glowing;
Vacancy reaches its vision for the space that is
there ever present,
Helpless spectators, roaring with songs like
the down of an eagle,
Where shall it go, 'ere it go where its wander-
ings lead it?
Up to the depths, where the circle of petrified
reached?
Cut it unbridled. Thus shall it ever swim,
deathless and dead!
The other poet, who had a huge harp
worked in zephyr upon the back of his
coat, handed me the following ballad
about "The Mysterious Maiden,"
which he subsequently published in a
Philadelphia Sunday paper:
An elephant leaped through the garden wall,
And a Juley shrieked in pain,
And the people gazed at the wailing moon
Was dashed by the evening rain
White unto the mountain base a tuid
As the thunder flashed afar,
And the cords of her patent harp were swept
By the master of the moon,
But the great yolk of the mail was swept

Who was choked to death by the vessel's mast,
And the moon began to laugh—
Yet the dated died, and the elephant
Cut sick at the thunder's roar,
And the maid—the left in the evening train,
And never was heard of more!
