"If there be any persons who base the obligation of infant baptism thus upon the inference so drawn from the Acts xvi, 38, I have nothing to say in their defense; but I do not know of any such; I bolieve, on the contrary, that there is not a single passage in the New Testament which directly refers, in its own proper or immediate meaning, to infant baptism, much less that there is any which proves its obligatory charac-
