. Coffee is one of the best distulectant known. While chloride of lime, and similar substances, producen smell that is almost as disagreeable as the stench sought to be destroyed, coffee is just as efficacions, and leaves a smell that is delightful to all. Experiments with it show, in one case, that a room in which meat in an advanced state of decomposition had been kept for some time, was instantly deprived of all smell on an open coffee roaster being carried thro it, containing a pound of caffed newly roanted. In another room, exposed to the effluvium occasioned by the clearing out of a manure pit, so that sulphuretted hydrogen and ammonia in great quantities could be chemically detected, the stench was completely removed in half a minute, on the employment of three ounces of fresh roasted coffee, while the other parts of the house were permanently cleared of the same smell by being simply traversed with the coffee roaster, although the clearing of the pit continued for several liours after... The best method of preparing and using the coffee for this purpose is to dry the raw bean; pound it in a mortar, and then roast the powder on a moderately heated iron plate, until it assumes a dark brown tint, when it is fit for use. Then sprinkle it in sinks or cesspools, or lay it on a plate in the room which you wish to have purified. Coffee acid or coffee oil acts more readily in minute quanti-

WILLBEES WORK IN THE LIGHT? They will. I have two glass hives which Librare experimented with for three seasons. The bees worked well, but I could not successfully winter them in the glass hives.

The first season, I closed the hives with shutters, to exclude the light until they had built comb. I then opened the shutters, making the hives as light as day. The bees worked well, and stored plenty of honey. About the 1st of october I closed the shutters. In November, Lexamined the hives again, and found the bees had consumed almost enough honey to have wintered them in a wooden hive. Since that time I always transferred the bees into a wooden hive, as cool weather approaches, and keep them there till spring, when I place them in the glass hives again, keeping them darkened for three or four weeks. Last spring ! placed one of the hives where the kun shone on it The bees immediately ceased work. I returned them and set the hive in the shade, but left it open to the light, when the bees commenced to work as usual.

From monthly report of Department of Agriculture, Seth S. Barnes, of Olean, Illinois, writes that, "On the 20th of May last, I planted a peck of Peerless Potato. By dividing the eyes, I made 460 hills, but on account of the drought planted on about 11% square rods. The land was very rich, and was worked to the depth of fifteen inches, and thoroughly pulverized. One handful of manure was used to the hill, composed of two-thirds hen-droppings and one-third leached ashes. The crop was not more than 300 grew. These were chines. worked three times with hand-hoe, and was dug the middle of October .-Yield 421 bushels, or equal to 583 bushels per nore. Ground seeded at the rate of 3 18-20 bushels per acre, with a failure of over one-third of the seed to grow. I have twenty potatoes which weigh between three and a light and four pounds. 
