AGRICULTURE.

### The Management of Clover Hay.

Clover should be moved as soon as 13 well in blossom. There is no neces sity to wait for a brown head; there witt be plenty to be seen before the crop is well down. Cut when the dew is off, and allow to dry until afternoon, when it should be shaken up and turned before the dew falls. If a tedder is employed, its constant use will fit the ·lover to be put in cocks the same day. If turned by hand, it may lie until the toon of the next day, when it may be but into cooks, made as high and nar-"ow as possible; they will shed rain better in this shape, and, if caps are used, a yard square will be sufficiently arge to coper them. Caps are to be trongly recommended, and the above ize is sufficient, as the top only needs rotection. Put up, and, thus protected, the hay may stay in the field until it is all made, when it may be hauled togethr. If any cock should be damp inside, prend for a few minutes; it will dry apidly. Clover cured in the cock is nuch more valuable than that dried in the sun, and wastes less in handling. Put a way the first cut hay by itself, in a place convenient for use in the spring. clows coming in early in the spring will thrive on this hay; the milk will ne largely increased in quantity, and be richer in quality, while the butter will come easily, be free from white curdy specks, and in color will not be

far behind that from June grass.

AMERICAN GRAPES .- A correspondent of the Boston Spectator, after a late trip through the wine-growing counries of Europe, is convinied that Amer-I rea grape growers follow too servilely the process of Europe culture. It is well known that the European grapes can be grown upon this continent only on the Pacific slope, where the climatic condinons resemble those of the western coast of the Bastern continent. Our nativergrapes being adapted to an enurely different class of conditions, would naturally be expected to require a different treatment. Our excessive pruning, for example, is thought by many to seriously eripple the productive power of American grapes. To test this matter for himself, the writer in the Spectator commenced to vary the treatment of his own grapes from the imported methods. He now raises his trellises to the hight of twelve feet, and trains his vines so as to produce the neaviest fruitage at the top of the treltises. He finds that their elevation ahove the ground, and subsequent greatel exposure to the sun's rays, secures them from rot and mildey. While those diseases, with leaf-blight and tendency of the fruit to bursting, affect to a coniderable extent the vineyards of his neighbors, he is entirely without anhoyance on that score.

A STRAWBERRY STORY .- A Writer in the St. Paul Press tells a huge straw-Herry story. He says he "has seen scores of miles of country a degree of latitude north of Fort Totten which was an almost continuous plantation of wild strawberries, growing, in many of the richer spaces, not on horizontal vines, but on bushes, many of them three and four feet high, on which the clusters of this delicious fruit attained a size rarely reached by assiduous cultiration. So profuse was this native proluction of strawberries on what is called the Pembina mountains that the cart wheels, crushing the berries as they revolved, were perfectly red with the wild vintage of the plains, and left long crimson trails, as of blood behind

AFTER THE POTATO BUGS.-Ducks are said to do good service in exterminating the potato bug. A gentleman of Piqua, Ohio, put a pair of Muscovys into his potato patch, which was literally swarming with the bugs. The ducks ate the bugs with such avidity that the latter were soon exterminated, and the patch'has not since been troubled with them. The ducks did not appear to suffor any ill effects from eating the bugs, and-were not slow in "taking in" all they could discover. The duck remedy is certainly worthy of attention.

To CURE THE HOLLOW HORN.-Take a good egg, make a small hole in the small end and pour out all the white, but leave in the yolk; add two teaspoonfuls of saltpetro to one of black pepper, till the egg is full, beating it well. Catch the animal affected and open its mouth; throw down the egg; hold its mouth shut until swallowed. I have never known this remedy to fail. I consider it much better than bleeding or doctoring the ear.-WILLIAM B. Blass, Scott County, Minnesota.


