DOWN WITH THE BUGS.

THE PEOPLE VERSUS THE COLORADO BEET—A GRAND RALLY CALLED FOR.

We call upon all persons who have farms and gardens to arouse, rally, rather themselves into regiments, and advance upon our new foe—the Colorado bug! The only safe and efficient method is to go through the potato patches daily and knock the bugs into a pan and they bury them and stamp them in a little labor each day in a garden, and a good deal each day in a potato field, will pay, and these pests ought to be taken in hand now and put down and kept down! It will save thousands upon thousands of dollars in clearing county to use prophylaxis in knocking out these bugs!

I will pay farmers to employ men by the day to go through their fields and knock off and kill the bugs, and pick off the leaves upon which the eggs are found.

H. Rawlins informs us that Paris green will kill the bugs, he having made a second trial.

Thomas Sharp gives like testimony. At Paris green is very dangerous to handle with.

The safest and surest way is to knock off and kill the bugs, and keep doing it. Do not become discouraged, give up the battle and plow your potatoes under, for it will pay to take all the necessary pains and labor to destroy the bugs.

Our farmers and gardeners should persevere and raise all the potatoes they can, for they will probably be scarce and high and good prices will be commanded for all that are saved for the market.

Bruce Moffatt informs us that the Colorado bug infested Iowa when he resided in that state, and that the farmers went through their fields daily and knocked off and destroyed the bugs and thereby saved their crops. The bugs are clumsy and tumble off easily. If they are destroyed in a stove persons should stand at a distance while they are being stoned as the stoning arising from them is deadly.—Springfield Republican.

The following directions on whitewashing are worth remembering—

A whitewash that will produce a glossy appearance, and will not rub off, may be made by using skimmed milk instead of water for slacking the lime, and making it of proper consistency.

When a ceiling has been badly blacked or stained it is well to add a little dissolved sulphur to the whitewash, the bluish tinge serving to hide the smoky surface. If other colors than white are desired, they can be made by adding different ingredients to the whitewash.

For stone color, four pounds of raw umber and two pounds of lamp-black to half a bushel of lime. For a light pink Spanish brown can be stirred in until the tint is correct. For a fawn color, add one pound of Indian red, four pounds of umber, and one pound of lamp-black, to half a bushel of lime. Chrome yellow will produce a lemon-colored wash.

To make the whitewash take half a bushel of un-slacked lime and stick it in a cask with hot water or milk. To this add one-half pound of whiting, one pound of glue dissolved in hot water, and a peck of salt dissolved in water.

For laying on the wash a pail, with a wire fixed across it, is needed to press off the brush as it is lifted from the whitewash; and in addition to a good whitewash brush, a paint brush is best to use in corners and between the pickets on fences.

Before whitewashing walls and ceilings, they should be wiped clean with a towel pinned over a broom.

After a little practice any one can become a skillful whitewasher. It is not easy work; it makes the wrists and neck ache, but persevere and you will be rewarded by the great improvement you will find in cleanliness and appearance. Take only a small quantity upon the brush, and avoid dripping; be careful not to put on too thick a coat at first, but after having gone over the ceiling once in parallel strokes, let it dry, and on put another one on crosswise, and finish off with a pale flat cutting. A good workman never lets a drop fall, and he dips his brush perpendicularly into the pail, taking care to have but a small quantity upon it.
