## OUR NAVY IN THE EAST.

The Corea-geographers give it the definite article, as they do the Hague and the Levant-has been the scene of a battle between our naval forces, under the gallant Commodore Rodgers, and five Corean forts, in which the Coreans lost five hundred men, and our forces three killed and nine wounded. One of the killed was Lientenant M'Kee, who was the first man inside the citadel in the assault. We trust the lesson will not have to be re-

peated to these barbarians. The Corea is one of the least known countries on the globe, when we consider its geographical extent and its teeming population. It is in form a peninsula, running nearly north and south, six hurdred miles in length, with an average breadth of one hundred and sixty miles, diversified in surface and in climate. The number of inhabitants is estimated at from ten to twelve millions. The prevailing religion is Buddhism.
