A Practical Dairyman

Gives some very good suggestions in the Utica Herald on tainted milk, which we copy for the benefit of ou cheesemakers hereabout. There is n dairying region in America where the water is better or purer than in our county; and to this we attribute the fact that tainted milk is very little known here.--[ED.

"In extreme warm weather cheese is often found out of flavor, while the cause seems to be hidden from the maker of cheese, many times, until too late to remedy the evil. In the season of 1868, I had charge of a factory in Erie county, New York, where the milk was brought to the factory once a day. The milk came in fair condition until June 19th, whon it was very much tainted, and continued so until July 22, when it disappeared for the rest of the season. The dairies were mostly small; the night's milk was cooled soon as milked, and brought in separate cans to the feet ory, which was much better than the morning's milk. About one-third of the patrons brought good ailk the entire season, which led me to think the cause was with the patrons. The time of receiving tainted milk was one of extreme heat, without ! clouds or rain. The farms are watered by the Cayuga creek, which sunk to a mere tivalet, leaving dead, stagnant water in shallow places on the rocks, from which cows drank. Those, that brought the best milk watered their cowe at their wells. On the 23d of July we had a severe thunder shower, when taint disappeared. Was the taint given to the milk from the atmosphere, or the water the cows drank? The thunder, shower removed the cause, whatever it may have been. We want good, cold water to make cheese. Is if not as important that cows should have the Albemarie Land Agency same to dright?''

COOLING OF BROODED EGGS .- An inquity is made of the German Poultry Journal whether eggs brooded upon and allowed to become cold can be natched; in reply to which it is stated that, from extensive observation, it has been shown that eggs which have remained cold for two days or more may even than besuctwo days or more may even then be successfully brooded, and that the nearer to the period of the escape of the young, the longer may this cooling last. It is however, necessary that at least half of the brooding period be passed, as, if eggs are left too long in the first half of the period, especially if this is repeated many times, the embryo will, in almost every instance, die. In the second half of the period the chick is already so far formed that a prolonged cooling is not especially injurious to it. It is also established that eggs thus cooled require a longer time than usual to come to maturity.




