AGRICULTURE.

ARTIFICIAL RAIN.

In England, where ancestral pride in land is aided by fixed and princely incomes, experimental agriculture is carried on as an enlightened, and congenial employment of capital and occupation of leisure. Draining has been spushed to such perfection there as to demonstrate that it may be overdone; and now surface irrigation is receiving the attention of landholders. AtStoke Park the system of irrigation with pure water has been tried with marked success. The surface experimented on is a tract of twenty acres, in grass, and the water has been applied in artificial showers, in the night, every night during the season of 1871, except when natural rains made artificial rains unmecessary. The apparatus consists of pipes laid in the ground, supplied from an elevated reservoir, into which the water is pumped by machinery.

The figures in the English experiment are as follows per acre: Interest (5 per cent.) on cost of machinery and pipes, \$7.50; superstructure and fuel, \$7.50; manure and other top-dressing, \$67.50; cost of harvesting, \$12.50; total expenses, \$95. The value of the products of each acre, being on crop of grass and grazing in theautumn of 1870, and two crops of hay in 1871, is stated at \$200; profit is thus \$105 per acre. On ground in the same tract and of the same character, treated in the same manner, except the irrigation, the net profit per acre was \$45. The interest on the apparatus for twenty acres represents a capital of \$3,000. Probably the same work could not be done for the same money in this country. But the same engine-power could be used for a much larger area than twenty acres. -- Exchange.

There are sections of the country where three out of every four farmers are in debt-their land covered with either judgement or mortgage-paying interest and paying taxes on the capital of others. This is a greatdrawback to the farming interests of the country - improvements in land, in buildings, in implements, and in live stock, all impeded by it. There is such a thirst for land-more acres than we can pay for, or property cultivate, that we waste our energies in trying to overcome difficulties that we have voluntarily placed in our own paths. We are so sanguine, that we get wedged in the trap before we see where it leads to, and then find a difficulty in backing out, without receiving severe scratches; so we try to push along with the sores bleeding, to the end of the chapter, which is often brought to a close by either death or the sheriff .- Eaton (Md.) Journal.

HIGH COST OF LIVING IN THE U. S .-A correspondent of the, Mark Lane Express writes from New York that although the laborer gets higher wages than he could get in England, the only article of living he gets as cheap is butcher's meat; bread, milk and vegetables are about the same prices as in England. Butter and eggs 40 per cent. dearer, beer 25 per cent., tea and sugar 50, coal 60 per cent. dearer, with at least double the quantity required; gas 200 per cent. dearer, and he will have to pay double for his tools, clothing, house rent, &c.
