The amount and value of these manures will of course depend largely on the kind of feed given. An animal fed wholly on hay and grain, in the usual way, will make righer manure than would be the case of hoth were well cooked as in the letif both were well cooked, as in the latrer case the feed would be more, thoroughly digested, and less of the valuable properties passed in the manure.

So, too, such a mixture of grain, hay, cornstalks and straw as above referred to well stormed will make less relative to, well steamed, will make less valuable manure than hay and grain alone. Hence, whenever feed is purchased, regard should be had to that which is best for making manure as well as for teeding. For instance, in buying hay it will be best to get clover hay, as that contanis a large amount of nitrogen, and is worth about twice as much as common hay for making manure. At the same time, good, fine, bright, early cut clover hay, is better for fattening cattle and sheep. For the same reason, the large amount of nitrogen, peas should have the preference when they can be bought for the same price as corn. And so too, where neither peas nor clover hay can be purchased, it will be clover hay can be fed, but some kind of grain must be purchased, it will be best to buy a portion of oilcake, say enough to feed one pound of oilcake to three or four of grain. Oilcake is not only very fattening, but it helps largely in making rich manure—it contains more nitrogen than any other feed that will be fed, while a high authority (Johnson) says the nitrogen is mainly passed in the manure. In making manure for wheat and other cereal crops nure for wheat and other cereal crops this is very important, as nitrogenous manures are most needed for these grains, and it is very probable that where neither clover hay nor peas can be fed, it would pay to feed a small-portion of oilmeal even if no grain has to be purchased. At any rate it should be an object with every wheat grower to make rich, nitrogenous manures, and in order to do this to provide plan. and in order to do this, to provide plentv of the best and cheapest feed within his reach for this purpose. 


