ENGLISH SCORE BIG SUCCESS WITH NEW TYPE OF AEROPLANE

London, Oct. 13.—"The English aeroplanes have proved more than equal to those of the Germans," says the Paris correspondent of the "Times." Special success has been scored with the new type of English aeroplane called the "chaser," which is capable of a speed of 150 miles an hour and can rise from the ground at a sharp angle.

AN ORDER FOR 50,000 STOVES FOR ALLIED ARMIES IN EUROPE Mercer, Oct. 13.—That talk of early peace between European belligerents is not to be taken seriously is indicated by the fact that the Reznor Stove Company has received an order for 50,000 sheet metal tent stoves to be used by French and British soldiers during the winter campaign.

RUSSIAN ARMIES PURSUED IN RUN FROM EAST PRUSSIA

London, Oct. 13, 8.50 A. M.—"The Star" London correspondent sends the following German official communication concerning events in the eastern theatre of the war: "After their expulsion from East Prussia, the Russian armies were pursued across the frontier. The center of the German military operations is now Poland. The whole of Poland, west of the Vistula, is now in German possession, the Russians occupying only Warsaw."

Red Cross Ship Sails for U. S. The Hague, Via London, Oct. 13, 6.15 A. M.—The American hospital ship Red Cross which arrived at Rotterdam last Tuesday sailed at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon for New York with 150 passengers aboard.

Killed in Quarrel Over War Ashland, Wis., Oct. 13.—After quarreling over the European war, George Gasper, a farmhand, yesterday lured his employer, Bert Walsack, into the woods and shot and killed him.

Mildred Carter's Husband Wounded London, Oct. 13.—Viscount Acheson, a lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards, is among those named in the list of wounded recently made public. Viscount Acheson married in 1910 Miss Mildred Carter, daughter of John Ridgeley Carter, former first secretary of the American embassy in London.

Two Bombs Dropped on Ostend London, Oct. 13, 7.50 A. M.—A dispatch to the "Times" from Ostend says that a German aviator dropped two bombs on Ostend Monday.

WHITLOCK REFUSED TO SEND NOTICE OF BOMBARDMENT

Washington, Oct. 13.—An official report received here yesterday describes the efforts of German military authorities at Brussels to send word through the American legation to the people of Antwerp of the intended bombardment of that city.

SAVING ARMY IS OFFERED \$100,000 FOR WAR RELIEF

New York, Oct. 13.—A conditional offer of \$100,000 for relief work in the European war has been made to the Salvation Army, it was announced yesterday.

1,500 GREEKS EXPELLED BY TURKS

London, Oct. 13, 9.20 A. M.—In a dispatch from Athens dated Monday, October 12, a correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company, says 1,500 Greeks have been expelled by the Turks from the town of Ergili, on the sea of Marmora, 53 miles west of Constantinople.

GERMANS FIGHT HARD IN FRANCE

Paris, Oct. 13, 6.50 A. M.—The efforts of the Germans who are fighting hard in an endeavor to effect a turning movement to the north of the long battle line in France, continue to hold the interest of the observers of the war. According to an official announcement German cavalry some days ago had advanced in the west as far as Cassel, 27 miles northwest of Lille.

South African Command Rebels

Cape Town, Union of South Africa, Oct. 13, 11.27 A. M.—It has been officially announced here that a command under Colonel Maritz has rebelled in the northwest of the Cape province.

Russian Fleet on Black Sea

Berlin, Oct. 13, via Marconi wireless to London.—It is reported that a Russian fleet of eight large vessels and ten small ships was sighted Saturday near Kustendje (a seaport of Rumania) on the Black sea, steaming in a southerly direction.

BRITISH MOTOR TRANSPORT TRAIN HALTED BY THE ROADSIDE A British soldier who is serving at the front as a Royal Field Artillery motorman writes:—"While the battle is on we have all our wits about us, and even if we score a victory we must follow this up by making the enemy run still further away. And, of course, the transports must follow hard after the troops, for they must be supplied with ammunition and will want food as soon as there is an opportunity to eat it. Before the order is given for the troops to advance, in fact often for hours—in one case it was thirty-six hours—before the battle begins, we have to stand by to set the motor going, and off we start, never knowing, but always praying, that we may get through successfully." GERMANS FIGHT HARD IN FRANCE

Endeavoring to Effect a Turning Movement to North of Long Battle Line
